What is anesthesia?

Anesthesia (An-es-thee-zhuh) is an insensitivity to pain, such as when we give patients drugs so they don't feel pain, move, or remember anything during surgeries.



True or false:

Animals don't feel pain like people, so they don't really need pain medications or anesthesia during surgeries.

FALSE! Animals DO feel pain just like people do. It would be a very bad and inhumane thing to do if we did surgery on our patients without anesthesia. We would never do that to a human and shouldn't to animals either!

This is a blood pressure cuff and measurement device.

Veterinarians use these to take the blood pressure of their patients. Blood pressure can show how well the patient's body is able to get blood around and to vital organs like the brain!





Here's a tough one: guess what this is and what it is used for!

This is a laryngoscope.

Veterinarians can use this to view the back of a dog's mouth to insert a breathing tube once they are unconscious.
