
Fun Fact or Fave Thing about Club

No matter what is ahead of you in your career path, you will be dealing with behavior, behavior issues, behavior questions, etc. so it is important to become competent and confident with behavior topics!


I love learning about the "basics" but we had a falconry lecture last year that was extremely interesting.










































